April Minutes Naperville Community Gardeners Meeting Minutes, April 7, 2008

Call to order: Meeting called to order by Mary Wright at 7:05. Tom Campbell 2nd.

Welcome: 44 members attended. Guests Davida Kalina, Marilyn Mills, Randy Scheib, Boyd Halfacre attended. Arup Bhuyan attended as a new member.

Minutes and Treasurer's Report: Eleanor Holt motioned to approve the previous month's minutes, Linda Thompson 2nd. Ron Ory motioned to approve the Treasurer's report, Mary Wright 2nd.

Announcements/Committee Reports:

- Plant Sale – Mary Wright reported that we need help on Friday evening for everyone to bring their plants. The trucks will come Friday at 5:00 pm and we need people there at 3:00 to help unload the trucks and help set up the tent and tables. Please sign up for more than one activity. On Saturday, the sale will start at 7:30 am so we want everyone there by 6:45 am. We need cashiers, people to water, do customer service, plant ID, publicity, refreshments, setting up tables, road signs, etc. Contact Mary Wright at to sign up. Members voted to have Brian Bell once again send out the discount postcards to previous customers. Mary will email out a similar flyer to club members so they can send out email notices to friends etc and to print off and post/distribute notices. Members are asked to get out any yard signs that they still have, and to display them the week before the sale.
- Plant Sale Member's Plants – Barbara Jones reporting for Betty Ference reminded folks to fill out the forms for what they will be bringing to the plant sale. (See Attached). Also let her know if you have plants to donate but would like some help digging/potting them up. Betty has committee meetings scheduled for

- Thursday May 8th and Wednesday April 23rd - contact her if you're available.
- Eleanor Holt asked for help on May 13th to plant at at Pre-Emption House at Naper Settlement.
 - Linda Thompson – Riverwalk mulching is Saturday, April 12th. We will meet behind 600 S. Washington at 8:00 am. If you don't see us right behind this building, walk up or down the Riverwalk to find us. Feel free to bring any helpful children. She is in discussion with the Park District to get some club recognition for our efforts in this area. Bring wheelbarrows, shovels, rakes and dress appropriately for the weather. Put your name on your tools. If you have a club tee-shirt or hat, wear that.
 - Linda Thompson asked if anyone is interested in doing a garden club picnic/garden tour this summer .
 - Ron Ory thanked those members who helped and will be helping at the Park District Gardening Seminars.
 - Beth Engle – Lizzie's Greenhouse is hiring part-time people.
 - Rob Beary - Peter Klassen would like people to submit articles/photos etc to him to post on our web site. Visit our web site www.napervillecommunitygardeners.org
 - Bob Elvert – said our March speaker from Ball Seed was sick and she will come back for our May meeting. Author Patricia Hill, originally scheduled to speak in May, will now be our speaker in June.
 - Beth Engle presented the mini-show. Ron Ory brought in Redwing Dogwood rooted cuttings which he gave to members. Beth said you need to prune out the older canes (3-5 year growth) as the new canes have the best color. Freda Haller brought in an African Violet. Beth brought in an fragrant orchid mounted onto a piece of handmade ceramic pottery. Our speaker Al Kosnow, brought in a rosemary bonsai. Eleanor Holt brought in a beautiful begonia 'Caravan'. Jan Gricus brought in some lamium (Spotted Deadnettle). Bill Mills brought in a rosemary and some rosemary cuttings, rooted with powder hormone. Rosemary Holdrege brought in amaryllis 'Naughty Lady' with variegated foliage which she got from www.amaryllis.com. Nancy Carroll brought

in a variegated yucca in flower. She also brought in giant pussy willow branches and amaryllis 'Flair'. Beth said when you are cutting amaryllis after flowering, you don't have to cut the entire flower stalk – you can just clip off the flower part (cut at an angle so it doesn't bleed water all over) as the stalk also photosynthesizes. Nancy brought in some tiny pink Glory of the Snow flowers. The winner of the cash raffle was Freda Haller.

Adjournment: Mary Wright motioned to close the meeting at 7:50 pm. Logan Wasson 2nd.

Presentation: Al Kosnow - Midwest Fruit Explorers www.midfex.org

Al Kosnow talked about growing fruit in small spaces. Fruit trees are generally not started from cuttings and do not come "true" when planted from seed (a common misconception). This is particularly true in apples because they have a huge genetic variance. The only way to get a "true" plant is from a graft on tree stock. The root stock is nourishing the grafted material. The root stock can also determine if the plant will be a dwarf. He had slides of fruit trees grown on an espalier – a way of growing plants on a wall to conserve space. He said you might not get that much fruit from a plant grown in this way but this is a way to get fruit in a very limited space. They can be trained to grow in this way on a link fence – attaching it to a link fence is very easy. It was amazing the size of the tiny spaces that Al grows these in! The graft is generally a few inches above the ground. He recommends growing gooseberries. There are no root stocks for pears that will dwarf them as much as there are for apples. He mostly grows the plants on the south and southwest sides of the house. They can be trained in a free form vs a more formal design. Al grafts most of his plants himself and he says that many people can do this themselves, with practice. His club runs a grafting workshop and lessons. One is this coming Sunday at the Chicago Botanic Garden at 1:00 pm and the lessons are free. There are different methods of grafting that

are used different times of the year. Animals can be a problem - raccoon, possum, deer, squirrel, chipmunk. Some years, pears will give beautiful fall color. The club web site www.midfex.org is a good web site which features a member from Skokie, who grows a tremendous amount of fruit on the M27 (dwarf) root stock. Pears are the only fruit that you should pick before they're ripe and they should ripen off the tree. If you let them ripen on the tree, they will be overripe on the inside. Seckel Pears (Sugar Pear) are the variety that Al recommends the most for growing at home. If you spray (fungicide) the fruit trees and they are against a house or fence, they might stain. Fruit trees grown on trellis, are taller than espalier-grown, and still grown in a limited space. "Stone fruits" – peach, plum, cherry etc need to be pruned correctly to fruit, so they can be harder to espalier. Apples and pears are the easiest to espalier. If you have them growing next to a house foundation, the concrete might leach and change the pH of the soil and tie up the iron so you might need to supply extra chelated iron into the soil or the plant will become chlorotic.
